The Oral History Master of Arts and the Institute for the Study of Human Rights at Columbia University are seeking a part-time instructor to teach a course on the intersections of oral history with human rights, social justice, trauma, testimony, organizing, and advocacy for the 2023-24 academic year, ideally in Fall 2023. This seminar will meet once a week for 2-3 hours, and will include a mix of Oral History, Human Rights, and other graduate and advanced undergraduate students.

Baseline compensation for teaching this course is \$10,000. OHMA's part-time faculty are provided with professional development funds and, after three years, research funds.
